Winterbournes & Watercress Project

On 13th August, Maggie Shelton from the Hampshire & Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust (HIOWWT) organised a meeting at The G&D to share proposals for 'Watercress and Winterbournes' - a new Heritage Lottery funded project aimed at protecting and celebrating the seven headwaters of the Test and Itchen rivers, which includes the Bourne & Swift rivers. The scheme is being co-ordinated by HIOWWT on behalf of a partnership of organisations. A number of local residents attended and have subsequently given their feedback on the project. We picked a difficult year to launch our wildlife initiative, with the drought limiting the amount of planting work which could be done. Dene Green was allowed to grow through the spring




without the usual mowing and whilst for some it looked 'scruffy', this resulted in a richer environment through the summer for beneficial insects. We will continue to try to manage Dene Green and other public areas in a way that encourages bio -diversity, whilst balancing the need for a tidy looking village.

Parish Council at the Village Show

Thank you to everyone who visited the Parish Council stand at the Village Show this year. The results of the voting on Parish projects are shown below:

Projects suggested by the Parish Council - (no. of votes in brackets):

Replace zip wire on KGV Playing field (3) Reinstate Community Speedwatch (5) Install red dog waste bin in Dolomans Lane (4) Install play equipment at Dean Rise Playing Field (4) Replace football posts and nets on KGV (1) Upgrade shelter on KGV (0) Progress Village Design Statement (0) Install outdoor gym on KGV (2) Produce Parish footpath leaflet & map (6) Upgrade tennis courts (2) Replace riverside railings in Church Street (6) Install speed indicator on B3048 valley road (2)



Other suggestions on the day:

Dog waste bags fitted to red bins (2) Reinstate permissive footpaths around HBT (18) Install picnic table on KGV (9) Better topping/mowing of footpaths (ROW) (6) More recycling options in the Parish (3) Instigate 30 mph limit HBT to Stoke (1) Install speed camera/sign on A343 (8) Maintenance in Dean Rise (3) Install zip wire from Doles wood to Church tower! (4)

Of the top 6, highlighted, the Parish Council are already considering 5 of them (as well as others)- the permissive path closures have already been discussed and no further action can be taken at this time.

The purpose would be to raise and administer funds for the support and benefit of residents, facilities and environment of Hurstbourne Tarrant Parish. Her portfolio is school liaison and play equipment - and her part in the design and purchase of the new climbing frame on the KGV field was a particular highlight.

"Why are we keen to prepare a Village Design Statement?"

It's an opportunity to establish a consensus description of the visual character of the village(s), which we all want to sustain - not frozen in time but maintaining the essential elements of the character as it develops. It's about the shape of the village and its building styles and how these relate to the broader landscape.

A Village Design Statement carries weight because it's researched and written by people who live in and know the village, not by anonymous planners or consultants. The more people actively involved in its preparation, the more influence it will have.

A Working Group has been formed, with the backing of the Parish Council, and is setting about organising an event (in March of next year) at which all residents will be asked to identify exactly what makes the Parish distinctive in their eyes, and through a camera lens. This will form the basis for preparing the Design Statement, which when complete will be submitted to TVBC for formal endorsement.
